Colorado

Mercy Community Capital

In Commerce City, Colorado, the graduation rate is 64.2% (well below the statewide average of 80.7%) and teens have difficulty bridging the gap between high school and a career when college may not seem like an option. Mercy Community Capital has partnered with Mercy Housing to help break this cycle at Mercy Housing's Holly Park Apartments by providing an apprenticeship program that connects minority teens with volunteer mentors in their field of interest. By connecting with mentors in interactive Zoom meetings, mock interviews, and weekly shadowing, along with resume writing assistance, the teens will graduate high school with a career idea and feel empowered to achieve the goals set through the program. With the help of FHLB's #500forGood, each program participant would receive a gift card when milestones are met, encouraging them to build a path toward a brighter future.

Denver Community Credit Union

With \$500, our staff would purchase and donate children's books to the Denver Public Library Foundation. All 26 Denver Public Library branches have been closed since the onset of the pandemic in mid-March. This project will help children in our community continue to learn and develop through reading. The Denver Public Library Foundation has been partnering with free meal sites to distribute books to at-risk kids and families via bookmobiles while most schools remain closed to students.

Through this project, we will support children's love of reading and learning. The Denver Public Library Foundation has a wish list of children's books recommended by child development experts. Our employees would purchase books from the list and deliver them to the Denver Public Library Foundation for distribution to children at meal sites across our region.

Century Savings and Loan

** This is with the caveat they can use the money for a holiday dinner since Thanksgiving will be finished For many years, Century Savings and Loan has contributed to Zion's Lutheran Church who puts on a Thanksgiving Dinner for low income individuals, shut in citizens, and homeless people in our community. The church typically will serve over 900 people each Thanksgiving. In past years, church members would prepare the food at home and donate it. Because of COVID 19, the church is required to buy all the food and prepare it, then distribute it to the community. Therefore, the burden on the church is much greater this year.

The food will be delivered to people's homes as the people cannot come in to the fellowship hall to enjoy it and follow the social distancing rules. The church also has a program called five loaves where they serve approximately 250 meals every two weeks to people who receive meals on wheels during the week. There is no program for them without the church stepping in.

I would like to nominate Zion's Lutheran Church's Thanksgiving dinner as Century's representative for doing good for our community. This is a tiny congregation with a large impact.

Kansas

Bank of Hays

Holy Family Elementary is working to implement STEAM (Science-Technology-Engineering-Arts-Music) instruction across the curriculum at all grade levels. To make the many supplies and materials available to classroom teachers we would like to create mobile STEAM carts that will be stocked with a variety of non-consumable (egos, marble runs, coding robots, etc) and consumable supplies (popsicle sticks, pipe cleaners, toothpicks, cotton balls, etc) for STEAM instruction. Immediate availability and organization of these materials reduces the preparation time required for STEAM lessons, and the mobility of the supplies makes them available to more students rather than being stored and used in one classroom. Removable bins will allow teachers to grab specific items that they need to bring them to the classroom.

STEAM instruction builds increases grows student creativity and problem-solving skills which will be necessary for success in future careers. Students build resilience to learn from ideas that didn't work as planned, determination to find a solution to the problem, and ingenuity to look for other solutions. Through this process, confidence and enthusiasm grows and engages students to solve more difficult problems in the future. The goal is to create four carts, two for the preschool-kindergarten-1st grade floor, and two for the 2nd-6th grade floor. The \$500 would provide us the funds to purchase one of the four carts.

Kansas Teacher's Credit Union

Annually, the local Salvation Army conducts a Christmas gift distribution to needy families. This year has been very difficult on many families in our community. Unfortunately, the need this year may exceed the Salvations Army's resources. Last year at this event I noticed an 8 year old boy not opening his gift. I asked him why he was not opening the gift. He stated that he was saving the gift for Christmas because it will be the only gift he will receive.

If we were selected I would donate the money to the Salvation Army to purchase additional gifts.

Impact Bank

If I had \$500 to help my community, I would donate it to the kids of AAHN'S PLACE (AP). AP is a residential group home for children 10-18. Kids often arrive at AP with just the clothes on their back as they are placed in DCF custody, most often through no fault of their own. These are scared children who are being removed from the home due to abuse, neglect, abandonment, etc. They are thrust into a new home, a new school and carry a stigma of being the kids from the group home. These are bright kids with much potential who are forced to create walls as many end up transient in nature, whisked away to the next stop often after just starting to build relationships. With \$500 I would work with the local leaders at AP to provide Christmas gifts, fun recreational activities or entertainment equipment that is not in the budget of a facility dependent on an under funded DCF. In short, I would use the \$500 to show kids, (again through no fault of their own) that people do care and want the best for them.

Farmers & Drovers Bank

I would match the funds with bank funds and use it to purchase gift cards from local businesses. I would give the gift cards to the employees our local Morris County Hospital, EMS and Clinic to thank them for their commitment to our community's health during the pandemic.
